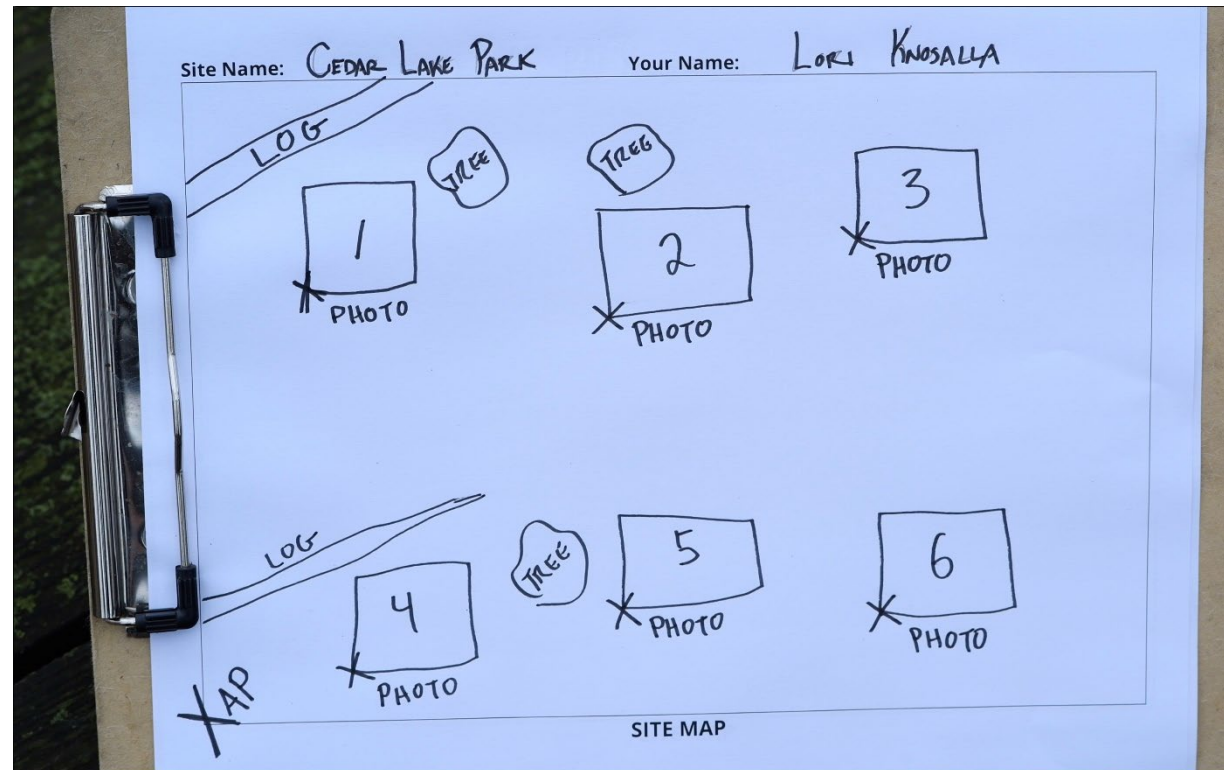


## What makes a useful site map?

Your site map is an important tool for the three-year course of this study. It diagrams the configuration and features of your unique site. One important function of the site map is to show you where to stand when taking photographs of your squares. We will be taking "time series" photos of each square. In order to compare these photos, we'd like to use the same vantage point again and again. Another important function of the site map is to help you recover your site in case any flags go missing or changes occur. Below is an example site map with a list of all the details that make it a useful tool:

### Include these details:

- Site name
- Your name
- Site perimeter
- Anchor point ("AP")
- 6 clearly numbered squares
- An "X" in one corner of every square, showing where to find the metal tab
- Along one edge of every square, the word "PHOTO" indicates where to stand so the metal tag is on your left
- Sketched natural features such as logs, tree trunks, etc.
